

Naval Science

The Naval ROTC program was established to educate and train young men and women for service as commissioned officers in the United States Navy or Marine Corps. As the largest, single source of Navy and Marine Corps officers, the NROTC Scholarship Program plays an important role in preparing students for leadership positions in an increasingly technical naval service.

Selected applicants are awarded scholarships through a highly competitive, national selection process. The scholarships include full tuition, a stipend for books, educational fees, and other financial benefits. Additionally, the University of Rochester provides a room-and-board grant for its NROTC scholarship students. A majority are four-year scholarships, while some are two- or three-year scholarships. After graduating, midshipmen are commissioned as officers in the Navy or Marine Corps.

Midshipmen work side by side toward common goals: academic and professional excellence and, The NROTC Rochester unit was founded in 1946 and was originally located in Harkness Hall. Named after Rear Admiral William Harkness, an 1858 graduate of the University, it was the first building outside of the Naval Academy to be entirely dedicated to military science.

Being a midshipman provides immediate opportunities for close camaraderie with others who value professionalism and excellence and seek the opportunity to serve community and country.

NROTC students pursue a variety of majors, with those planning on entering the Navy focusing on engineering, math, and the sciences. Midshipmen are actively involved in all the University has to offer, including intercollegiate athletics, student ambassadorships, study abroad, and numerous clubs and organizations.

The University of Rochester is the host school for the area's

NROTC program. Typically, about 75 students are enrolled each year with about half enrolled at the University of Rochester. The rest attend the Rochester Institute of Technology, SUNY College at Brockport, or St. John Fisher College and travel to the University for their training and naval courses.

Accomplished Faculty

The unit staff is composed of Navy and Marine Corps officers and senior noncommissioned officers, as well as government civilian and University civilian personnel. The military officers complement the academic training students receive with the years of military

experience they bring to the naval science curriculum. Military staff members also serve as mentors to the midshipmen and assist them in the successful completion of all aspects of their NROTC and college experience.

Outstanding Preparation

The high-quality education at the University is recognized by the Navy and Marine Corps in the placement of graduates into the most selective military programs, such as the Navy's nuclear power community and its aviation community.
